## **Natural Gas Service Coming to Wyalusing**

"I come bearing some good news," Julie Lewis of Leatherstocking Gas Company, LLC told those attending Tuesday night's biannual dinner meeting of the Greater Wyalusing Chamber of Commerce (GWCC) at Grovedale Winery.

"We are excited to report that we have initiated a pipeline grant application to bring natural gas to Wyalusing," Lewis said. The audience responded with enthusiastic applause and cheers.

Lewis went on to say that Leatherstocking didn't anticipate any problems with the grant process and approval is expected by October. That would mean construction could tentatively start by next spring, Lewis said, adding "but don't hold me to that date."


Leatherstocking Gas Company, LLC is a joint venture between Corning Natural Gas Corporation and Mirabito Holdings, Inc. and is a gas distribution

company, regulated by the Public Service Commission. Leatherstocking has brought natural gas service to Montrose and other Susquehanna County communities.

Natural gas is said to be the most cost-effective home heating fuel available. Customers will, on average, spend less for space heating, water heating, cooking and clothes drying using natural gas than using any other energy source.

Lewis said the Wyalusing project would first bring natural gas from a pipeline near Cargill in Wyalusing Township to Wyalusing's Main Street and downtown business area and then, depending on demand and applications filed, to other parts of the borough.

Leatherstocking first proposed bringing gas service to the borough in 2014 and then at a public meeting in August of 2016 reported that only 51 applications from 36 people had been filed in a survey of interest from borough residents and business owners.

"We are excited about this," Lewis said concluding her remarks. "This is great news," GWCC President Jeff Homer said.

#### Aliciene Talks About Tax Changes

Saying "We've been working hard this past year," GWCC President Jeff Homer summed up some of the chambers accomplishments since the previous dinner meeting.

"Our Social media campaign has really taken off and is getting some pretty good traction," Homer said. Hopefully those of you who have Instagram and Facebook are feeling the benefits of that."

He went on to say that a barn quilt app for smart phones is about 90-percent complete and should be up and running in a month or two. When completed it will show those following the barn quilt trail a map highlighting nearby businesses.
